Round-Penning with God

When my wife and I started Haven Acres, we knew very little about horses. Now, after completing our third year of programming, we still have much to learn, but we have gained some experience and spiritual insight from being around and dealing with the horses in our herd. We are always looking for ways to relay spiritual messages to the kids while they are at Haven Acres. Our trips to Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch in Bend, Oregon have provided us with ideas for sharing the hope we have in Jesus through analogies of real life ranch experiences and spiritual matters. It's basically a modern day parable. Jesus spoke in lots of parables, using familiar, every day situations to explain spiritual truths. This works at Haven Acres as well.

Deuteronomy 33:26 "There is no one like the God of Israel. He rides across the heavens to help you, across the skies in majestic splendor."

One example that hit home for me was taught by Troy Meeder, one of the founders of Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch. It deals with round-penning. Round-penning is a fundamental exercise that you use to build trust and respect with a horse. The basic principles of round-penning are as follows: you stand in the middle of the round pen while the horse moves along the rail at differing speeds depending on the instructions they receive from you. The goal is to control the speed and direction of the horse in order to establish leadership so that the horse learns to trust and submit to you. After working with the horse for a period of time, you invite them into the middle. At that time, the horse will probably be breathing hard and will be anxious to rest and catch their breath. The horse must decide whether or not they want to join you. The only way for the horse to find rest is to choose to yield to you and come to the center. This is called "hooking up." After the horse catches their breath, the last part of the "hook-up" involves the horse following you as you walk around without a lead rope or any other tools to guide the horse. They follow you because they trust that you will ensure their safety and will keep them from danger.

The spiritual application of this exercise changed the way I viewed God.

Picture yourself as the horse, running around the round pen with God in the middle watching everything you do. **God is inviting you to join Him so that He can take on the weight of your burdens**, but many times you choose to keep running in circles instead of coming to the middle and finding refuge and rest. For example, if there is a financial crisis, you tell God, "I got this! I'll just work a few extra hours." If you're having health issues, you forget to pray about it and just decide to go to the Dr. and take some medicine. If you're having trouble in a relationship, you try to fix it on your own. You end up making excuses. While you're being stubborn, the whole time God is inviting you to the center, willing to heal your sicknesses, bind up your wounds, bless your finances, protect you from harm, and restore your relationships. Like the horse, **you have a choice to make**. You have to come to the middle to experience the safety, comfort and peace that God freely offers to you. If you submit to God and trust His direction, He will lead you. **Even if He changes your course, you can trust His divine leadership**.

When I teach young men to do this exercise with their horse, many times it brings a tear to my eye because I see the young man growing in his self-esteem, leadership skills and confidence as he leads an animal 10 times his size to trust and follow him. As I share the spiritual application of this exercise, I hope and pray that these boys will submit their lives to God and put their full trust in Him.

Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."
