

### **Fixed On Jesus**

Doc came to us this spring, walking down the trailer of the ramp as a tall, 16-hand bay gelding. But he didn't calmly walk down the ramp, he anxiously pushed past. With his head high and nostrils flared, this big, powerful horse danced a full circle around his handler, fearfully looking this way and that. Eyes wide, lips tight, ears erect, muscles tense--all the textbook signs of fear. He looked nervous and antsy, and he was looking everywhere but at his handler. Too worried about the new surroundings to pay any attention and listen to her at all as she tried to guide him down the ramp to his new home.

He had come from a trail riding company who said he was a great kids horse. Unfortunately, they could no longer keep him since he had developed heaves, which is like equine asthma. They didn't have the means to care for him and the manager was excited for him to go to a good home where he would be well cared for.

A few days after Doc came, I started working with him by simply throwing his lead rope over his back in a rhythm, an exercise we do when we're first starting to build a relationship with a horse. The goal is for the horse to stand still and relaxed while you're doing it. Throw it up, land on his back, pull it off. Throw it up, land on his back, pull it off. But instantly Doc started to nervously dance around. Throw it up, land on his back, pull it off. Dance around, try to pull away, flinch at every motion. Eyes wide, head up, muscles tense . . . just at the rope gently landing on his back.

If Doc would just focus on me and trust me he wouldn't have to get so worked up about this rope. He doesn't need to be afraid that I would hurt him. Just because the rope is new and different doesn't need to mean it's scary.

If only he would keep his eyes fixed on me, his heart trusting me, and his head focused on me, he could relax about this little rope.

If only we would keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, our hearts trusting in Him, and our heads focused on Him, we could relax about all those things in our lives that worry us.

If we would just focus on Jesus we wouldn't have to get so worked up about the things in our lives that change or seem like they might hurt us. We don't need to be afraid of God putting us through anything that isn't for our good.

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Just because something is new and different doesn't need to mean it's scary.

A horse's God-given instinct is to run and then think. It keeps them alive in the wild. So they naturally have a deep fear of the unknown. But it's an amazing thing to behold a horse and rider that have built so much trust that the horse will do anything that she's asked to do. That horse has her attention fixed on her handler, never wavering, always focused. Ready to go through gunfire, down steep hills, or over huge hurdles. She keeps her focus on her rider, listening for every cue from his hands, more than listening to the unknown. It doesn't matter what the unknown looks like: that horse knows she needs to keep her attention on her rider rather than let fear seep in. It's all about where the focus is. Focus shows that a horse trusts her rider.

When we have unknowns in our lives, our natural tendency is to look everywhere but God. We look to other people, to our abilities, or just get paralyzed looking at the circumstance itself. We are running late for something important, and do we trust God in His sovereignty? No, we worry about how it's going to totally ruin something. We know we need to confront a friend or family member about something and worry, worry, worry, rather than trusting God to work through the situation.

And we end up looking like Doc. Tense and jumpy because we're looking at the circumstance rather than looking at Jesus. If we would only look at Jesus-and that takes really hard work most of the time--we would find rest. We can bring so much delight to God, like a horse who wholly trusts in her rider. Trusting equals rest: peace. Peace is the absence of fear, anxiety, and stress. Peace is wholeness, fullness, contentment, tranquility, safety, and security. It's what we all want! And Jesus gives it to us when we trust Him and His promises.

When we trust Jesus, who is the rider in our lives, we rest knowing that everything He brings us through is for our good. Instead of anxiety about the illness, we can have peace knowing God will work it out for our good. Instead of fear when we are going into a new situation (job, college, state), we can walk confidently knowing that God is with us. Instead of stress about getting all the daily things done that we need to do, we can rest in the fact that God is already on the other side and knows we'll be ok.

Caden was diagnosed with Autism at two years old and is non-verbal. Inherent with Autism is the incredibly difficult task of trying to communicate with Caden or understand what he is trying to convey. He spends much of his time twirling ribbons in an effort to relieve himself of the anxiety induced by living in a world that he can't understand. He thrives in structured environments with clear direction.

Every Monday Caden attends Haven Acres for horseback riding. He starts his session by helping with chores such as picking up the strings from the hay bales or filling the animals' water troughs. At first he had a hard time following directions and keeping his helmet on, but after several weeks, he seems to better understand the routine. He's even started participating in grooming the horse. But the real magic seems to happen when he rides the horse. The calming effect that horseback riding has on him is truly amazing to witness. He goes from being fidgity or even agitated on the ground to being relaxed and quiet in the saddle. He looks peaceful.

The Haven Acres program has helped Caden with taking direction and interacting with people as well as animals. Another very surprising thing we have noticed since starting at Haven Acres is that he has begun to verbalize more things! Even his bus driver commented on this improvement. We are grateful to see Caden learning new tasks and hearing spiritual lessons at Haven Acres.
