Second, the finances. I love that God has a plan for us long before we are even aware of it. Shortly after the New Year, we received some inheritance money. Our initial plan was to make improvements to our home, but when confronted with this opportunity, we could not justify spending thousands on superficial things that did not matter in the span of eternity. So, the money paid for the adoption instead.

Third, the speed. Most adoptions take at least one year to process. Ours had to be finished in seven months. The 2.5 pound stack of papers was overnighted to the U.S. government and arrived ON Alex's 16th birthday, a miracle of enormous proportion!

Last, the attachment. Working with various kids from hard places, attachment becomes one of the most difficult and critical issues that they and their caregivers face. To assist in preparing both child and family for the transition of adoption, we were encouraged to have virtual visits. From the initial meeting, we knew that Alex belonged in our family and felt a profound connection with him. We have found Alex to be extremely affectionate and loving, amazingly resilient, and able to attach and build relationships. This is nothing short of a miracle!

There are some striking spiritual parallels as we have been navigating this thing called adoption. It's crazy to think that we spent countless hours filling out forms, invested a substantial amount of money, interrupted our comfortable family dynamic, and ventured into the unknown all for someone we had never met. And yet, how much more has our Heavenly Father done for us? Ephesians 1:5 says, "God decided in advance to adopt us into His own family by bringing us to Himself through Jesus Christ. This is what He wanted to do, and it gave Him great delight." He chose to add us to His family, in spite of our failures, our sin, and our reluctance. He invested everything He had by sending His only Son to pay the price for our sins. Romans 5:8 explains, "But God demonstrated His love for us in this; While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

On the flip side of the coin, adoptees also make some significant sacrifices when they agree to adoption: leaving their birth country, adapting to a new language and culture, saying goodbye to friends and the familiarity of their surroundings, and choosing to follow, adapt to, and do life with a family with whom they are newly acquainted. The enormity of the loss overwhelms me.

It's not so different for a person when they choose to become a Christian, accepting the offer of adoption through Jesus into the family of God. There are things that are lost: bad habits, familiar yet unhealthy friendships, the risk of severing family relationships for some, and the "right" to live selfishly. Instead, we take on the responsibility of living righteously. But in the end, the gains are so much greater than the things lost both in physical and spiritual adoption! Because of this adoption, I have a greater understanding of what Christ has done for us and how much God desires relationship with His children.
